## OUR MISSION:

At McMaster, our purpose is the discovery, communication and preservation of knowledge. In our teaching, research and scholarship, we are committed to creativity, innovation and excellence. We value integrity, quality, inclusiveness and teamwork in everything we do. We inspire critical thinking, personal growth and a passion for lifelong learning. We serve the social, cultural and economic needs of our community and our society.

## OUR HISTORY

- Founded in 1887 in Toronto through a bequest from Senator William McMaster, a member of the first senate after Confederation, founding president of the Canadian Imperial Bank of Commerce and chair of the Great Western Railway.
- Relocated from Toronto to Hamilton in 1930.
- Maroon and grey were adopted as the official colours in 1912.

## OUR STRENGTHS

- Consistently ranked among Canada's most research-intensive universities by Research Infosource (2023).
- Ranked 4th among Canada's medical/doctoral schools in the Research University of the Year ranking by Research Infosource (2023).
- Ranked 98th in the world by ShanghaiRanking's Academic Ranking of World Universities 2023.
- Ranked 33rd in the world in Times Higher Education's University Impact Rankings 2023, based on the Sustainable Development Goals of the United Nations.
- Winner of the 2018 Global Teaching Excellence Award from the Higher Education Academy for our strengths in experiential learning and our commitment to global engagement.
- Ranked #3 for Graduate Student Research Intensity by Research Infosource (2023).
- The McMaster Model, a problem-based, student-centred approach to learning, has been adopted worldwide.
- Home to more than 60 research centres and institutes.
- More than 70 international exchange agreements.
- The only North American host site of a United Nations University, the Institute for Water, Environment and Health (UNU-INWEH).
- World-class athletic facilities; National women's basketball champions (2019) and national football champions (2011).

## OUR STUDENTS

- 32,174 undergraduates and 5,363 graduate students, for a total student population of 37,537.
- In the 2022/2023 academic year, 29% of all McMaster students were international students, from 125 countries.

- International graduate students represented 29% of the graduate student body in fall 2022/2023.
- The percentage of undergraduate students registering with an admission average of 90% and above has risen from 13.9% in 2000 to 70.1% in 2022/2023.

## OUR ALUMNI

- More than 235,740 alumni represent 147 countries, including Canada.
- Cabinet ministers, business leaders, scientists, university presidents, Hollywood actors, Olympians, an astronaut.
- Nobel laureates: Bertram Brockhouse (professor emeritus), co-winner of the 1994 Nobel Prize for Physics; alumnus Myron Scholes, co-winner of the 1997 Nobel Prize for Economics; alumnus James Orbinski, alumna Donna Strickland, co-winner of the 2018 Nobel Prize for Physics.

## OUR FACULTY AND STAFF

- 992 full-time instructional faculty members (excluding clinical educators).
- Our research intensity averages \$407,300 per faculty member ("Research intensity" measures research income per full-time faculty member.)
- 111 endowed chairs, 86 allotted Canada Research Chairs, 13 endowed professorships, one Canadian Institutes of Health Research Chair, two Ontario Research Chairs.
- Selected as a Hamilton-Niagara Top Employer for the past nine years in a row.
- Recognized as one of Canada's Best Diversity Employers for six consecutive years.
- Ranked 85th in the world and 5th in Canada in the 2024 Global Employability Ranking.
- Employing more than 17,000 people in 11 employee groups.
